# President's Letter – Rich NN3W

# G reetings to All in PVRC land!

2012 has been quite the year for your contesting club. While the year started on a somber note - the loss of our last charter member Bill Schuchman W7YS - the club has lived up to its reputation as an active, vibrant, and dynamic organization. PVRC took top honors in the Club competition category in several club competition events (including what appears to be a clear and decisive victory November in the Sweepstakes); PVRCers were active in many conventions including the Visalia DX convention, the Dayton Hamvention, and DXCC East; PVRCers were on the go to far flung hospitable (and some not so hospitable) locations including Afghanistan, Thailand, Taiwan, and Yemen. Finally, PVRCers were enjoying the company of each other and guests in the many chapter meetings, barbecues, open houses, and end of year parties. We are very much an active club.

While every PVRCer contributes to the overall "vibe" of the club, the leadership

often has a quiet, behind the scenes role in ensuring the continuity of the club and its continued vitality. At the December 3, 2012, dinner held at PJ Skidoos in Fairfax, Virginia, the new slate of officers and trustees for 2013 was announced. Absent from that list were two individuals who have volunteered their time and efforts to serve as trustees through 2012 and are passing the torch to new hands: Bob Finger W9GE and Ed Moore NW4V. Bob and Ed have helped guide the leadership through an amazing year, and I am extremely grateful for having served as elected leaders in the PVRC. Thank you both!

Looking forward to 2012, I'm pleased to announce two great efforts that will be of major interest to the club and to its membership:

First and foremost, as announced at the December 3 dinner, the Potomac Valley Radio Club has been honored with the privilege of serving not only as the "headquarters" station for the American Radio Relay League in the 2013 IARU HF World Championship, but also serving as "headquarters" station for the the International Amateur Radio Union for the same contest. Yes, PVRC is going to be the HQ station for BOTH entities! Based on their abilities to manage large groups of hams (not unlike herding cats), their ability to engineer stations, and their devotion to radiosport in general, I have asked that Frank Donovan W3LPL and Steve Bookout NR4M serve as the two "captains" for this event.

In addition, if you were present at the December 3 dinner, you would have been witness to the "blind" call sign draw competition where - by sheer chance (or luck) - Steve drew W1AW as his team's call sign. Thus, we will hear W1AW/4 QRV from July 13, 2013 - July 14, 2013, and NU1AW/3 QRV from July 13, 2013 – July 14, 2013. The details on the teams are still being worked out, but our goal is to have as many capable stations on the air serving as "headquarters" stations - potentially up to 11 or 12 different stations from W3 land and up to 11 or 12 different stations from W4 land. Even if you cannot serve as a host or as an operator at one of the headquarters stations, we would LOVE to have you work them!

Just to drop some red meat in your laps: the ARRL record for W1AW is held by the Florida Contest Group from 2000 with 10.7 million points and a total of 11,121 QSOs, while the NU1AW record is held by the Connecticut gang which rang up 9.3 million points and total of 8,545 QSOs.

Adopting an exchange from the famous film "LA Confidential":

Bud White: Do you want to tear all that down? Ed Exley: With a wrecking ball... You want to help me swing it? Frank and Steve (i.e., Bud and Ed (in no particular order)), proceed without delay!

Changing gears, last month, Dean Wood N6DE, the Vice-President and Contest Chairman of the Northern California Contest Club, proposed that NCCC, SMC and PVRC engage in a friendly competition involving the North American QSO parties. After discussion with the officers and the trustees, we've decided to accept the invitation. The competition will work as follows:

The competition is a year-long event based on activity in the six North American QSO Party events (i.e., the Winter CW, RTTY and SSB events and then Summer CW, RTTY, and SSB events). The scoring is based on the total score contributed by all participating club members (i.e., the sum of all raw scores) times the number of members participating in the event. Where multi operator (multi-two) entrants are comprised of both club- members and nonclub members, the raw score is apportioned based on the number of club members that are part of that multioperator entrant.

Unlike other events, there is no circle limitation. Thus, stations like W6MVW in California can contribute to the PVRC score, as can stations like W3SO who is just outside of the traditional PVRC HF circle. In order for your score to count though, you must actually submit a log to NCJ for scoring.

As with the IARU competition, the final details will be announced shortly.

With either event, we hope that you can get on the air, represent the club, and, above all, have fun!

So, on behalf of the Officers and Trustees, my best wishes to you and your family as we turn the page from 2012 and enter into 2013.


# Howie K4PQL (N4AF)


# Art K3OAE (K3KU)


## **Dick WN3R**




