Congrats also to venerable Frankford contester Gerry Mathis, W3GM (ex-W3BES), who over the years has played about the same role for the FRC that Len has played for the PVRC. He got Contest Hall of Fame plaque #7.

Personally speaking, as the person who held the job just before Don, I have to say that he cleaned up a lot of the mess that I left him. WB2EKK will edit the <u>Contest Cookbook</u> to be published by early November. Articles profiling each band for the CQ WW and SS contests are needed.

K3ZO: Arrangements for the <u>Holiday Dinner</u> have been made by W3GRF at the Andrews AFB Officers' Club and it will be held Wednesday, Dec. 11 at 7:30 p.m.

W3EKT: The multi-multi team at W3LPL for the <u>CO WW RTTY</u> contest made a new record this year with 2 million points, 1700 Q's, 600 mults.

W3ABC reported on ARRL/FCC/political issues regarding a new assault on the amateur bands by commercial interests. A bill has been introduced into Congress which would exempt Amateurs from user fees and authorize issuance of special call signs for club stations.

In discussion concerning the desirability of the <u>FRC Packet interconnection</u>, N3RR and KM4YY said that the system was slowed down by the interconnection. Most of the members felt that the slowdown was acceptable considering the input of new putouts.

President Don Daso, WA8MAZ, opened the meeting and introduced the honoree of the evening, Leonard Chertok, W3GRF, who has been elected to the CQ Contest Hall of Fame. This honor has been extended to only 6 other Operators in the history of this Award.

The President introduced Charles Weir, W6UM. Dr. Weir read a letter from Robert Cox, K3EST, Director of the <u>CQ Magazine</u> Hall of Fame, and presented a folio of this and other testimonial and congratulatory letters (editor's note: These came from K4VX, W2SKE, W4KFT, W6AXX and W7RM.) He also gave a number of personal observations and reminiscanses concerning Len's many and diverse contributions to amateur radio operating, DXing, contesting, and station construction.

Then Gene Zimmerman, W3ZZ, gave the results of his research into the world records that Len has set in contesting. Dr. Zimmerman also listed the calls of many top contesters, active in today's contests, who have been directly and positively influenced by Len in their contest careers. Many of this country's great super-stations of the post-war years could not have been built without Len's generous contributions of materials, time and technical expertise. Then Gene presented Len with the Award, an engraved plaque.

President Don Daso, WA8MAZ, presented a talk entitled "Grips, Gaffers and Best Boys," giving the Members an insider's view of what goes on behind the scenes in motion picture production companies.

Dear Lenny,

It is with a great deal of personal pleasure that I congratulate you on your entrance into the CQ Contest Hall of Fame. Since its inception in 1986 by Dick Ross, the publisher of CQ magazine, the CQ Contest Hall of Fame has inducted five previous members: K2GL, KH6IJ, OH2BH, G3FXB and W8IMZ. This is an honor reserved for those few persons who have contributed their time and skills to contesting in such a way that the hobby is significantly enhanced. Enhancement means not just hardware development but also the touching of the lives of persons who in turn influenced the hobby. You certainly qualify on both accounts. The 60's and 70's were the formative years of modern contesting, and the Washington, D.C. area was the "Harvard of contesting". Through your generosity and hard work stations like W3MSK(W3AU), W4BVV, K4VX, W7RM, W3FA and others grew and became successful. The number of high level contesters who received their early training at these stations was unbelievable: K1AR, KC1F, K3LR, W3ZZ, K3EST, N4RV, KT4W, KT3Y, K4PQL, K2SS, N4KG, W6UM, N4RP, N4IN, W3TMZ, W3AZD, K3ZO, K3RV, K7SS, K7LXC, K7JA to name just a few. To a very large extent you made it possible for this time to exist.

You were there when the PVRC was just getting started. Through your friendship and contest rivalry with Vic Clark, W4KFC you raised the excellence of others in the PVRC and elsewhere seeking to emulate your efforts. I know that I remember your "can do" attitude about just about everything. You made it possible for many of us to remember growing up as contesters in the DC area as a golden time. Most people do not realize that in the early 1950's the CQ WW contest was in danger of floundering. You were part of the PVRC's rescue of the contest by checking the logs until the

contest found a home with Frank, W1WY.

You have won the CQWW CW test for the world. A feat not likely to be repeated soon. Your station has provided the opportunity to perfect the skills of many operators such as W7RM, KODQ, W3ZZ, K3ZO, and myself. For many years W3GRF has been AIR during the armed forces day celebration. I still remember taking a shift at your place during the May event. As a member of the CQ Contest Committee, you have contributed to the betterment of Your ideas as a committee member influenced the contesting. direction of the CQ WW contest.








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
