The Tommy Rockford Books

Browsing through the school library back in 1962, I came across a slim volume with what seemed at the time to be a terrific title—*SOS At Midnight*. I opened it and began to read, delighted to find it was about radio. I'd discovered what could be found on the big Zenith by turning a switch marked "BAND" and listening carefully while setting the dial to an area labeled "AMATEUR."

Recently, I was telling someone who is not a ham about this book which was written by Walker Tompkins, K6ATX. (I had also read the two sequels which followed: *CQ Ghost Ship* and *DX Brings Danger*.) In this conversation, I mentioned that the books were probably a bit dated, but still provided a good introduction to our hobby for a general audience, young people especially. Even more recently, I found myself reading the back cover of *Midnight* while standing in a local radio emporium. There are now six Tompkins titles, all featuring hero Tommy Rockford, who also goes by the call K6ATX. And updated? A package for \$25? Let's see what young people get for an introduction.

In addition to the three already mentioned books, there are *Death Valley QTH*, *Grand Canyon QSO*, and *Murder By QRM*. I read these three first, (it takes about an hour for each). Then I read the earlier ones just to see how they had changed.

Tommy Rockford hasn't changed much. He's still the bright, eager California kid whose curiosity gets him into trouble. Tommy has only "aged" two or three years in the 30 years he's been entertaining us. He was a high school senior in *Midnight* and he's a college student in *QRM*. His life and activity revolve around ham radio. He shares the same values and youthful enthusiasm we accepted from *Tom Swift* or *The Radio Boys*. Maybe those beliefs are out of fashion currently, but the information presented about our hobby is solid and wide ranging. Nearly every facet of hamming is presented, or integrated into these stories.

The writing sometimes gets thin. You feel the strain as Tompkins tries to stretch a plot line or manipulate dialogue around a ham radio twist or turn. Yet, you keep going because you like Tommy that much.

And those updates? For earlier readers, the stories have shifted with the times. Tommy was apparently one of Heath's bigger customers. Now, instead of the venerable DX-100 (central to *Midnight*), the radio of choice has become Heath's last—the HW-5400 transceiver. Two-meter FM has replaced Gonset boxes and so on, but nothing that is central to their story lines has been changed. You'll enjoy these titles. Maybe some of your younger friends or relatives will, too. □

Marathon: Contest Software for the Mac

Before the current contest season began, I found myself faced with a dilemma. I wanted to enter the world of computer contest logging. Having used CT during several multi-single efforts from K3DI, it seemed the obvious choice. Unfortunately, my XYL and I already owned a Macintosh (which was great for everything except contest logging) so I couldn't justify buying a PC solely for contest operation. Fortunately, Kevin Krueger, NØIOS, has stepped forward with a contest program for the Mac called *Marathon*. I bought a copy and gave it a test drive during the November CW Sweepstakes.

The current release of *Marathon* supports ten contests including CQ WW, ARRL DX, and the ARRL November Sweepstakes. *Marathon* has the standard features that contesters have come to expect in even the most basic logging programs (e.g., real-time dupe checking and check-partial). In addition, NØIOS has included a CW interface, a packet radio interface for connection to the DXCluster, a computer-to-rig interface, and a maintainable country and prefix list for DX contests.

There are some neat things the operator can do with *Marathon*. Since the program is built around the Macintosh GUI (Graphical User Interface), most of the pop-up windows are scrollable and sizable to the way you want them. This means that if you don't like the log window at the bottom of the screen, you're free to grab it with the mouse and drag it to where you want it. You can also pull up most windows at the same time and "stack" them on the screen in any order. This was particularly useful in the Sweepstakes when I wanted to leave the multiplier checklist on the screen. Since *Marathon's* packet window is scrollable (it holds over 8,000 characters) you can review DX spots that have been pushed off the screen. This could be especially useful when DX spots are coming in a tidal wave during a contest. Once you select a spot, a keystroke moves the DX station's call into the log entry window. Frequency and mode can also be grabbed from the packet window when the computer-to-rig interface is active.

The 48-page user's manual provides complete instructions for updating *Marathon's* country/prefix list. Beam headings and distances are calculated automatically once you supply your Maidenhead grid locator. Finally, for those of you (myself included) who think the operating table is crowded enough without a mouse to deal with, *Marathon* allows the operator to perform nearly all functions with the mouse OR keystrokes.

There are a few rough edges. The *Marathon* CW interface will not directly key the rig. The user must supply an ASCII-to-CW interface (e.g., AEA Morse Man or PK-232). Also, unlike CT, *Marathon* does not filter needed multipliers from the packet window into an announce window. While this wasn't an issue in the Sweepstakes it would be a problem for a serious packet-assisted entry in a DX contest. There is also no facility for doing a super-check partial look-up.

Is this program as good as CT? In my opinion, "not quite." However, I like this program a lot. Macintosh users finally have a full-featured contest logging program that provides nearly all of the features we've come to expect from CT. If you're a Macintosh owner, *Marathon* is well worth considering. □

DINNER AND PROGRAM

After dinner, Acting President ND3A introduced Richard Hiner, W4HMK, Director of the Navy Broadcasting Service. Dick related humorous experiences in his career in broadcasting. ELECTIONS

Election of Officers. CAMPAIGN PLATFORM

The above listed candidates feel that PVRC must now move in some new directions. Seven specific club activities for 1993 have been chosen, based on feasibility and maximum impact.

1) EVERY club member will be asked to contribute some time on at least one of the following projects. Contributions will be publicized in the PVRC Newsletter. *Rationale:* It is unrealistic to expect that a dynamic, active club will result from the efforts of just a few people. Many hands will make light work.

2) The club will enter ALL contests with a club competition category. *Rationale:* This is intended to be a contesting club. Everyone learns by contesting.

3) The PVRC Famous Contesters College (FCC) will be founded, with the purpose of teaching both new and current members how to contest better than ever. *Rationale:* We learn faster by sharing, and new members learn fastest from all of us who already are members.

4) A new member recruiting program will seek out potential new members interested in contesting together and in contesting better. *Rationale:* By growing our membership selectively, the club becomes stronger.

5) Recognition will be given to all members, new and old, for their achievements in specific contests, and in learning about contesting better. *Rationale:* Recognizing the accomplishments of each of us is both good incentive to contest and to learn, and it's fun!

6) A member station assistance program will be established. Any member can ask for help in making station improvements. Each member receiving help will be expected to assist on three subsequent projects for other members. *Rationale:* Successful contesting requires good hardware and software. We learn safe, effective station design and construction by doing it together.

7) Develop a system in order to get all PVRC'ers on packet who are interested. *Rationale:* By having every member of PVRC on packet, club members can send information concerning club activities at a much faster and reliable rate.

OLD BUSINESS

Initiative to increase Club contest participation. ND3A reported the following goals for the CQ WW contests:

Phone	37 million	(32 million last year)
CW	35 million	(30 million last year)

Ways to increase contest participation. In discussion: (1) For those who would like to participate, but who do not have competitive stations of their own, the following multi-single stations may have operating positions available: KE3Q, K3DI, W3GG. (2) Packet node Sysops will add a sign-on announcement soliciting operating positions and operators to fill them. (3) K3ZO renewed his offer to put any member's handwritten log on his computer to generate a printed and duped log ready for mailing. (4) KM4YY found the PVRC's *Contest Cookbook* to be very useful when he began operating contests, and urges the Club to maintain this publication for new testers coming into the Club. (5) W4RX said that in the early days of the Club, help was available to members from other members in erecting and repairing antennas. Such a group effort might enable a station to enter a contest that would be off the air, otherwise. Several members expressed interest in reviving this PVRC tradition. (6) KE3Q suggests making presentations to other non-contest clubs in an effort to attract potential new testers. Speakers are always in short supply for radio club meetings, and area clubs welcome a PVRC presentation. (7) KM4YY offered to continue his sponsorship of an Award plaque for new members operating with wire antennas. (8) WZ3Q is putting together a presentation made up of slides of members' antennas and operating positions. This presentation could be used as recruiting medium.

Packet report (W3LPL). Over the past weekend, the first amateur radio packet microwave link was established on 1296 Mhz. The Frankford Radio Club cluster will remain connected during the CQ WW contests this year.

N3RR resignation. N3RR, 1992 President of the PVRC, is no longer able to perform the duties of his office due to professional responsibilities. His letter of resignation was regretfully accepted.

THE PVRC STORY

Don Daso, WZ3Q

The concept of a radio club specializing in contest and DX operating activities began in the Washington area shortly after World War II. Resuming activity after the War, hams at the Pentagon's Army Signal Center organized during the summer of 1947 at the home of W4KFT in the Aurora Hills area of Arlington. The club called itself the "Aurora Hills Radio Club," but the current name was provided by W9NWX (now W0DX) within a few weeks.

The Potomac Valley Radio Club has a long tradition of club competition success in contests, both domestic and DX. PVRC members dominated ARRL Sweepstakes and DX contesting throughout the 1950's. Considering that club membership totaled around 40 members during that era, this record of performance speaks well of members' station design and operator skills. Today, PVRC members maintain this emphasis on operator skills, with a continuing record of many contest victories and high scores. Keeping our tradition of "once a PVRC member, always a member," the club literally has members world-wide. Past and present members have operated from every continent, and there are active "members" from every US call area. Each June, there is an on-the-air "reunion" that brings out the

contest spirit, and an opportunity to renew old friendships, and work some choice DX.

Each year, the club has an annual joint meeting with the Frankford Radio Club, a contest club in the Philadelphia area. Alternating locations yearly, these get-togethers are a unique way to meet some of the "competition" and share stories and ideas. Each year, the club has an annual "Fowlfest" summer picnic, which is a chance for families to get together. Regular meetings run from September to May. Meeting locations in the metropolitan area alternate monthly between Maryland and northern Virginia.

This briefly outlines the history and activities of the PVRC. If you have never tried a contest, give one a go. It is a unique and special way to accomplish several things at once:

- ✓ Increase your code speed
- ✓ Improve your operating skills
- ✓ Work some new DX
- ✓ Determine how well your station plays
- ✓ Have some fun!

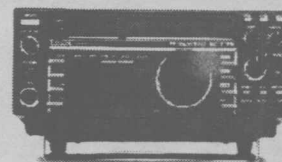
