President's Letter – Bud W3LL

A pril was a stellar month for PVRC.

Members converged onto their chapters to discuss the merits of each VP candidate and to vote for the candidate of their choice. Chapter chairmen were ready with ballots and instructions. Treasurer Bill N3RR hand carried chapter ballot envelopes from the post office to the adjudicator. Trustee Ken KE3X along with sons Aiden and Connor triple counted the ballots and sent the tally results to Secretary Tim N3QE who posted the photo finish results to the reflector. In the end Ted W3TB emerges as the winner over Dan K2YWE by two ballots or a margin of less than 2 percent. That's what happens when we have two outstanding candidates nominated.

This month, VP Tom and his team developed and submitted the PVRC Mission Statement garnering approval from both the officers and trustees.

April also marked the beginning of the second quarter which signifies time for the quarterly Leadership Conference Call to all officers, trustees and chapter chairmen. All work list items generated from the first call-in were completed and we're ready for a new list of challenges from the membership. I'll have more to say about this next month as your editor has me submitting this article prior to the end of the month.

Although PVRC is a club sharply focused on winning club competition contests, many of our members also moonlight as DXer's. The past two months provided a cornucopia of activity with four outstanding DXPeditions from South Sandwich, South Georgia, Heard Island and Juan de Nova. All rare ones providing a possibility of adding up to 4 ATNOs (all time new ones) to your DXCC total and maybe Honor Roll or top of the Honor Roll with the deletion of Kingman Reef. Also don't forget the DXCC Challenge where up to 44+ band modes could be tallied.

Next up is Dayton. I can hear the plans of PVRC members taking shape! Hope to see you there.

Don't forget the Contest Super Suite at the Crowne Plaza. PVRC is sponsoring pizza on Friday night.

I'll be at the contest dinner on Saturday evening and afterwards at the Crowne Plaza Super-Suite with a sign-in sheet for PVRC members and quests.

This time of year things tend to be a little slow but we have two events I'd like you to mark on your calendar. The first is WPX CW May 30 & 31. If you can, get on, have some fun, and help contribute to the team effort. It's the last HF event which qualifies for the Club 5M program for 2015-2016.

The second item is our Reunion the first weekend in June. You've probably heard the saying "Once a Member, Always a Member" of PVRC.

Well, on June 3-4, PVRC will continue with a 47-year tradition - the PVRC On Air Reunion. This event encourages all PVRC members to search each other out on the air and chat about old times, new times, and just catch up. Since we're a 'contest club' after all, there will be scoring, multipliers, and focus frequencies as usual. Our Secretary Tim N3QE will again take on the role of PVRC On Air Reunion Contest Director. Watch the reflector for further details from Tim.

What does PVRC mean to you? I think sometimes we forget about all of the work that our members do to make PVRC the great club that it is. Do you admire the 5 Million Point Program Plaque hanging on your wall? How about the PVRC club win plaques, endorsements or gavels? Thank Bill N3RR for his hard work. Do you check your 5 million point totals after every

contest? Thank Alan, AA4FU. Do you attend our Chapter meetings? These happen because members like Dan Zeitlin K2YWE, Art K3KU, Rich NN3W, Bill NR4C, Eric W3DQ, Eric WG3J,Bill N3XL, Nate N4YDU, Henry W2DZO, Jim WX3B, Larry K7SV, Tom ND3N, Mark N2QT, Don W4ZYT and many others organize them. Club officers and trustees work in the background keeping the club running smoothly. Also thank Eric W3DQ, reflector administrator, Bob K4NTO webmaster, Neal K3NC for the Galactic Event. Join me also in enjoying this issue of the PVRC newsletter presented by our editor John K3TN. Please take a moment to think about what PVRC means to you and thank one of our members who "makes it happen."

Do you know that PVRC requires nearly \$3,000 in cash flow each year? Our treasurer Bill N3RR recently reminded me of this. Although we have income from advertising, we need sufficient member donations because of the IRS 35% rule for 501 (c) (7) entities: We cannot have non-member sourced income (which comes mostly from our non-member advertisers) exceed 35% of all revenues. That's where you come in. If you appreciate all that PVRC does for you please donate to this worthy cause.

Also, did you know last year we received \$2500 in donations from only 48 members out of over 300 members who participate in the 5 Million Award Program and over 400 on the PVRC reflector? So far this year PVRC has received member donations of only \$336 from just eleven members. At "The PVRC Christmas Dinner" last year PVRC received \$885 in voluntary member donations. That's donation revenue that we will no longer see unless members continue to donate via other means. So, we more than ever are in need of your individual donations.

Now it's off to the races with our sports section update.

The major contest season is now tapering down a bit. Since the last newsletter, the only additional 5M contest in the books is the CQ WPX SSB event. 3830 scores list 39 PVRC entrants. There are a lot of categories in this one, and many of our members found their niches. Let's start with the big guns - the PVRC multiop entries: WX3B defended the US and NA M/M title with over 6.000 QSO's and a score of 24M. KE3X (at N3HBX) took the top spot in US/NA multi/single HP with a score of 17.5M. KB3WD put up a No. 1 place in multi/single LP (2nd place world) with 11M points. Big single op scores included N3KS (as KU3K), No. 2 in SO HP US with 15.3M and K3ZO at 10.4M. New PVRC member AB3WS took the top spot in SOAB QRP in the Rookie overlay - way to go Sonny!

There were a few other entrants worthy of note with a PVRC connection (if not PVRC qualified scores). KU1CW (Alex is a WRTC 2014 competitor) operated well-known PVRC station W4AAW in VA remotely from the west coast taking the top US spot in SO (A) AB HP with a score of 5.7M. PVRC's own Tucker, W4FS, had a victory in his category in the Rookie overlay, but was operating out of circle using a remote station in ENY.

At the mid-point of the NAQP Club Challenge, PVRC is in the lead, positioning us for possibly reclaiming the NAQP Club Challenge Cup. For the complete details, take a look at the really neat NAQP Club Challenge Web site by K9WX. The link to the current standings is here.

With the January/February NAQP's in the books, PVRC has 1.2 billion (yep, that's right, billion!) points vs. 628 million for The Society of Midwest Contesters and 262 million for The Northern California Contest Club. PVRC put up big numbers in CW and SSB, while SMC is continuing to dominate the RTTY events big time. Last year, SMC put up a big lead early and played to their strength in RTTY to beat us. But beware: complacency is a danger! SMC has shown that they can put up big scores in these events when they put their mind to it, so a comeback in the summer events is a real possibility. PVRC had 314 participants in the January/February events, but SMC wasn't terribly far behind at 260. The NAQP Club Challenge web site also shows the scores submitted by each call, sorted by club, and it is fun to look at that, too. Prepare to contribute to a show of force by PVRC in the July/August NAQP's! The Club Challenge works by multiplying total scores submitted by total participants. so we need both the dedicated and casual ops from PVRC to come out and

PVRC scored a club victory in the FL QSO party for 2015. PVRC'er N4CW in FL put up a big score (143K) as a mobile. 14 PVRC scores were submitted, including some big numbers from K7SV (88K), W4EE (80K), K4QPL (52K), AA4FU (47K), K4EU (44K) and WJ9B (43K).

The GA QSO party also saw some serious PVRC competitors, with N4CW putting up 46K and K4QPL scoring 43K.

That's it for this month. The navigator has the chart on the plotting table covered in vellum along with parallel rules and protractor. Sextant in hand, timepiece hanging from the neck, and Nautical Almanac with sight reduction tables pulled from the shelve ready for a present position FIX. He's ready to start a course correction plot while waiting for a destination from the Leadership Conference... No GPS for this crew.

Please contact me (Mark N2QT) for info and attendance updates. Thanks to Bob W4HY for arranging all this.


Results of "Contest Category Shopping Ethics Survey – John K3TN

During the end of last year there was CQ-CONTEST commentary on people posting their results on 3830 scores in one category, but submitting to the contest sponsor in a different category – mostly going from Multi-Multi to Multi-Single or the equivalent in an effort to choose a category where their score would win, or at least place higher.

I put up a survey on the issue and got over 300 responses, results shown below. While there was some feeling my wording was biased towards the "No issue" answer, a clear majority felt there was nothing official about 3830 and as long as sponsors allowed it there was no problem selecting your category after the contest.


Q1 With the use of the 3830 scores reporting web site, it has become possible to look at the 3830 posted scores and decide to change your entry category before you submit your log to the contest sponsor. Examples are moving from Multi-Single to MultiMulti or Non-Assisted. This is generally not against any rules, but many consider it to be unethical or unacceptable behavior. Do you feel that changing your contest category after the contest is over is unethical?

Making Changes to ARRL Contest Rules - John W2GD

Recent discussions on the FRC Reflector about rule changes compelled me to write this short article about the process used to make ARRL contest rule changes. Let me give you a hint - the process is rather drawn out and yes - in today's terms you might see it as being burdensome and bureaucratic.

Full disclosure - I served as the Hudson Division Contest Advisory Representative for five frustrating years.

There are four ARRL entities that interact in the contest rule change process:

- 1. ARRL Board of Directors (ARRL BOD)
- 2. ARRL Program and Services Committee (PSC)
- 3. ARRL Contest Advisory Committee (CAC)
- 4. Headquarters Awards Committee (HAC)

Below is what I believe to be the current process for implementing contest rule changes - you will not find it defined in any detail on the ARRL website. As you will read it is full of start and stop points with multiple opportunities for a change request to be nixed.

It starts with one or more ARRL Directors sending a request to the ARRL Program and Services Committee (PSC) which may in turn decide to 'task' the Contest Advisory Committee (CAC) to discuss and vote upon the topic in the request. The PSC acts as a filter and can stop requests before they are passed to the CAC for discussion.

The ARRL Contest Advisory Committee (CAC) does not have the charter to take any action on rules or any other aspect of contesting independently. Since sometime in the 1980s the CAC's ability to make rule changes was taken away by ARRL BOD. The CAC can only make recommendations and only on subjects that it is 'tasked' to consider by the ARRL BOD through the PSC and general the CAC is not allowed to discuss other topics on their own initiative. The CAC is comprised of representatives appointed by each ARRL Director. K3WW is the current Atlantic Division representative.

The present CAC Chairman is FRCer George, K5KG. The Chairman receives the 'taskings' from the PSC staff liaison NN1N and circulates them among other CAC members who submit comments. The Chair consolidates CAC discussion points, may request additional comments, hold conference calls to discuss the topic, and ultimately may bring a subject to a formal CAC vote.

The Headquarters Awards Committee (HAC) reviews CAC recommendations and may decide to return them back to the CAC for changes or additional review. They also advise the PSC on CAC recommendations when they are returned to the PSC which ultimately decides if the requested change is submitted for ARRL BOD approval.

Bottom line, if you want a contest rule change, it must be initiated by an ARRL Director, and it then must get past the PSC, CAC and HAC hurdles to be enacted.

During the second half of 2015 we received a total of 64,357 cards following our total during the first half of the year of 76,552 cards. So the total number of cards received during 2015 was 140,909 cards, or in other words a nine percent drop from our 2014 total of 154,023 cards.

This follows last year's ten percent drop in QSL volume compared to the 2013 total of 171,135 cards. It is only speculation to hazard a guess as to why bureau volume continues to drop off, but my best guess is that a combination of increased use of LotW along with a gradual decline in the sunspot cycle are responsible.

(LotW user count is now above 86,000 and since estimates of the numbers of DXers and contesters out there usually come in between 100K and 150K – LotW is past the tipping point – K3TN)

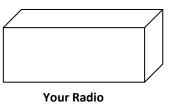




